Read-Aloud Guide - Reading Is Fundamental

Rhymes, repetitive phrases, songs, and predictable language Try these read-aloud tips: • Newborns can only see about 8-14 inches away Hold the baby in your lap; make sure he or she can see the pictures • Play with words, sing, and make up rhymes; include the baby's name • For very young babies, do not feel pressured to read all the

Phonological and Phonemic Awareness Handouts

Make rhymes using children's names and nonsense words (such as Holly's Folly or Shantal Lantal) Be sure that children know that the point is to have fun not make fun! Say a sentence aloud and ask your child to determine how many words were in the sentence Explain that rhymes are words that sound the same at the end Read books containing rhymes over and over again As you read, have your child complete the rhyming word at the end of each line
